About Me One-Page Story Workshops

An About Me One-Page Story is a simple yet powerful tool. It provides information on a single sheet of paper that supports staff to know what really matters to people and how to support them.

Adapted from Helen Sanderson and Associates' person-centred tool, this one-page summary of what matters to a person represents the foundation of person-centred practice.
